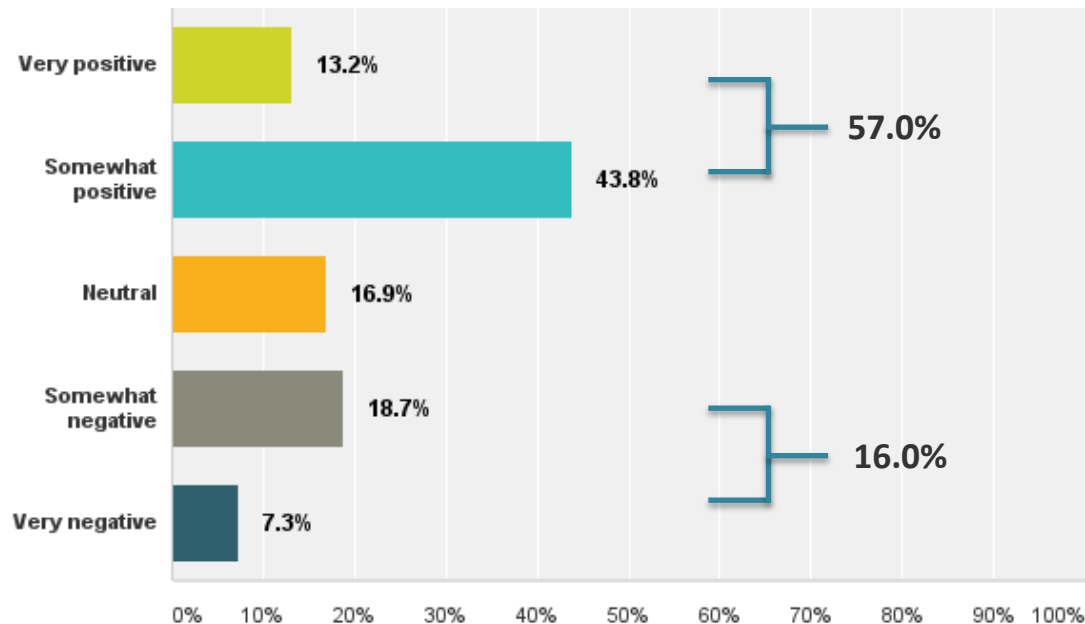

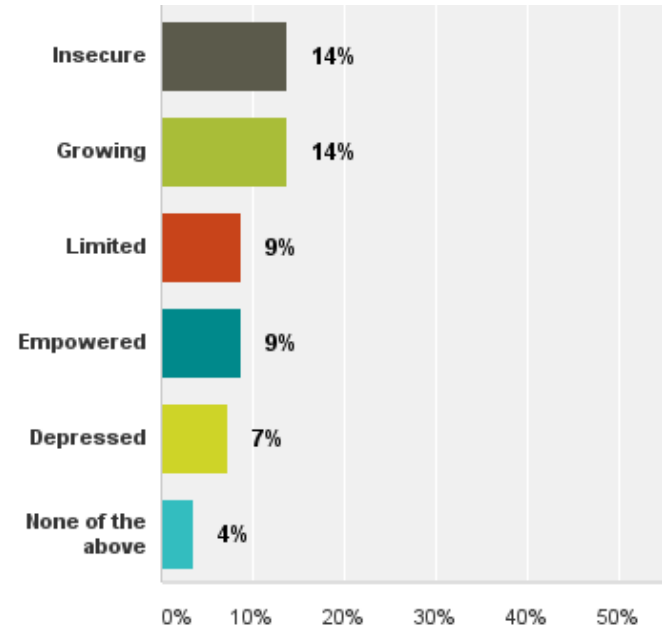
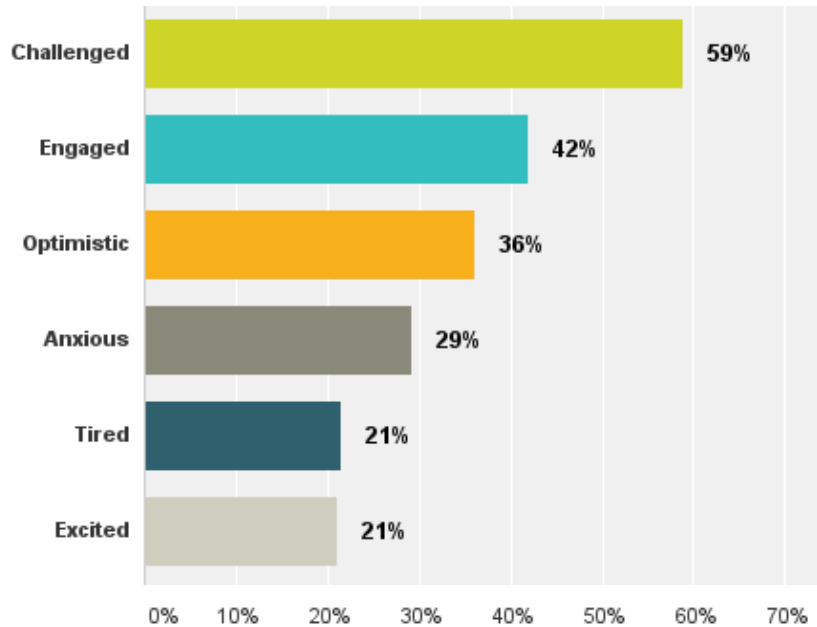

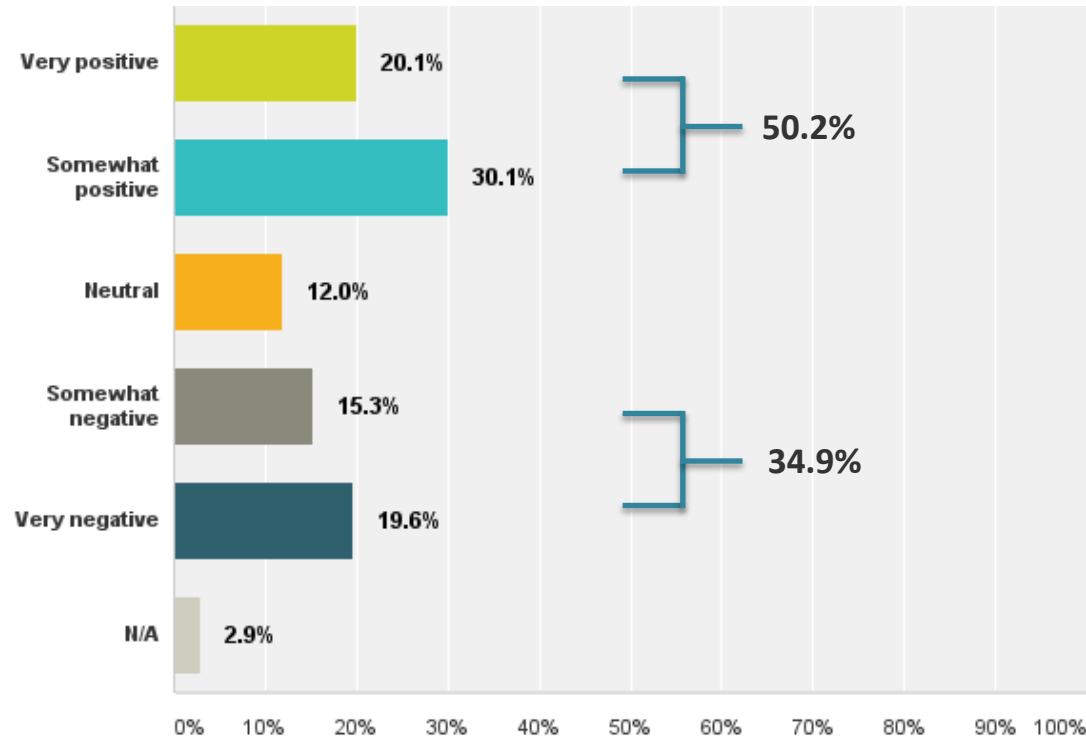

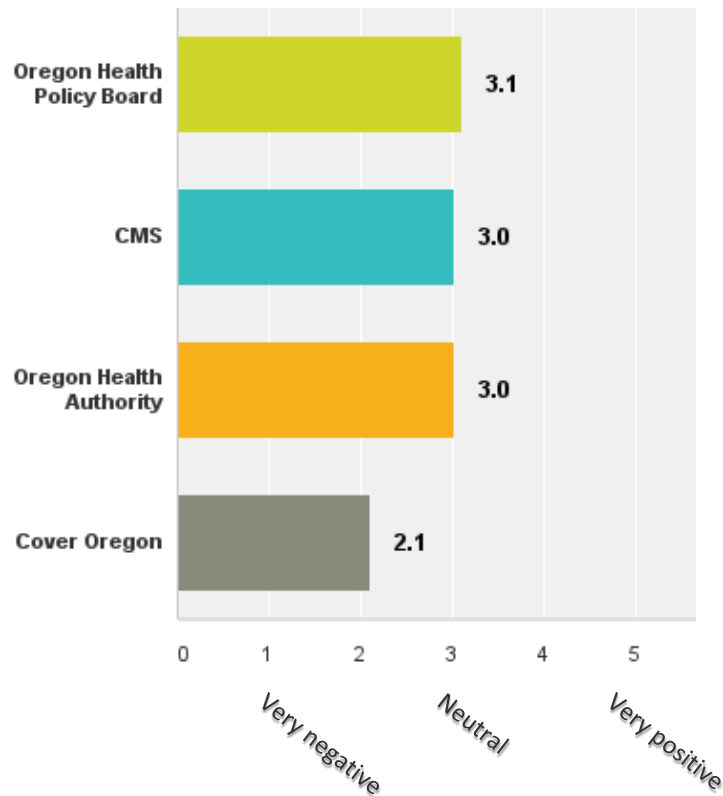
Q2: In addition to your general outlook, which of the following adjectives more specifically describes your outlook for 2015? Please check all that apply.



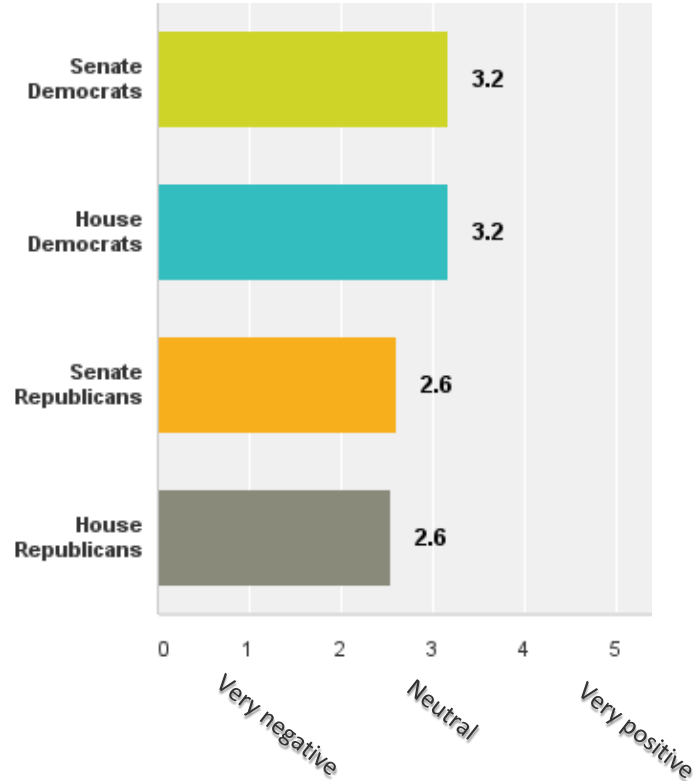
Q3: Generally speaking, how would you rate Governor John Kitzhaber on health care and health policy? Is your opinion generally positive or negative, based on what you know today?



Q4: Generally speaking, how would rate your overall opinion of the following public sector agencies?

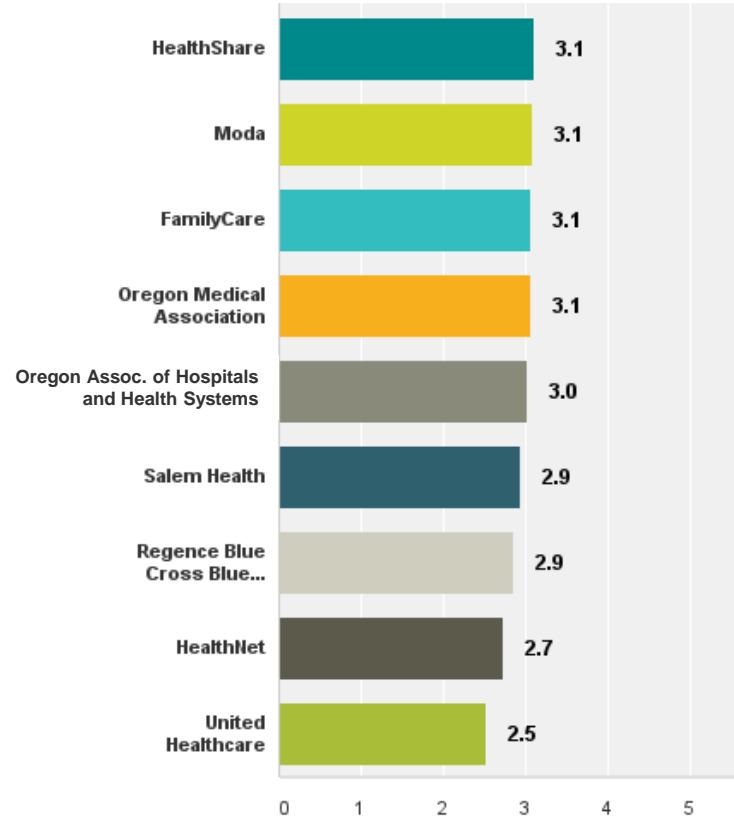
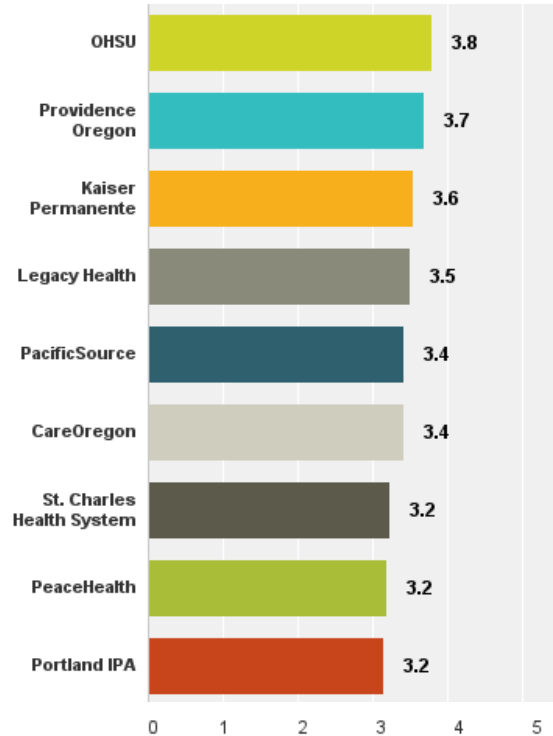


Q5: Generally speaking, how would rate your overall opinion of the following caucuses in the legislature?
