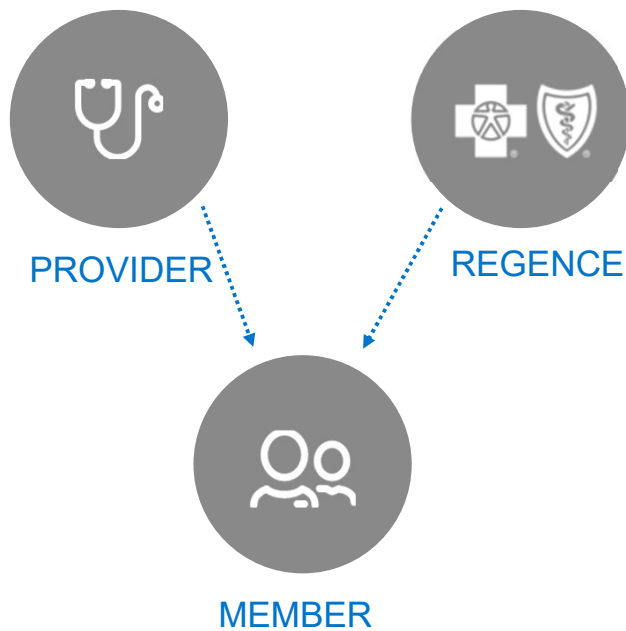

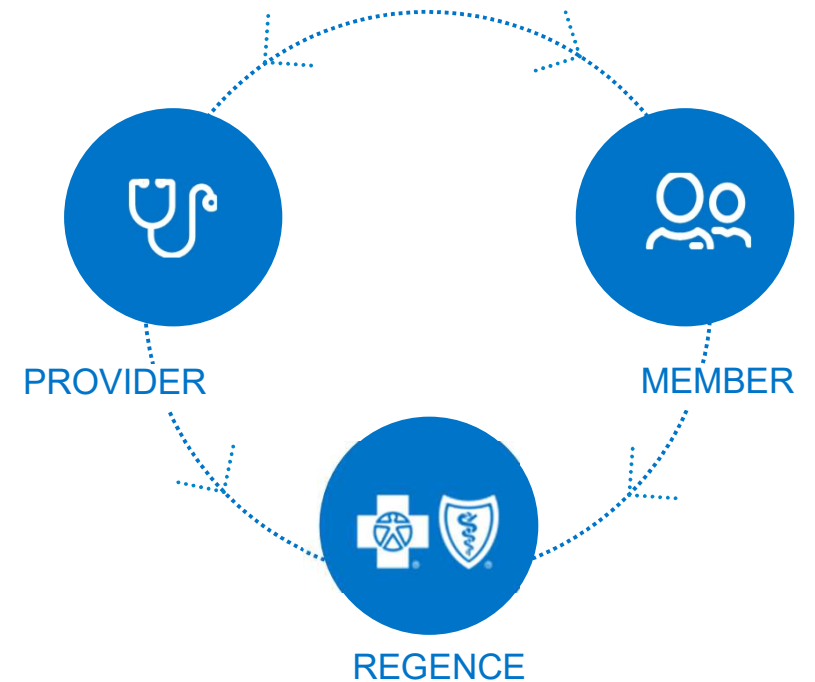

Monica's story



Opportunity

Monica lives with bi-polar disorder and was flagged by Regence for high ER use. We found that she received care management from Regence, as well care from her provider, but the two sides were not working together.
